Fellowship Offers DREAM to New Grads

Recent college graduates or those looking for a new career can now find *their* DREAM working to make dreams come true for children with disabilities at the Barber National Institute. A new program, the DREAM Fellowship, offers a one- or two-year commitment to work as a paid staff member in the Elizabeth Lee Black School.

The DREAM Fellowship – short for *Daring to make a difference, Reaching out with compassion, Educating every child effectively, Aspiring to become transformational leaders and Meeting the needs of society* – is a unique opportunity for recent graduates to work with children ages 3-21 who have autism, intellectual disabilities, physical disabilities and mental health challenges.

"The Barber National Institute believes in Dr. Gertrude Barber's vision that every child deserves access to high quality education," said Dr. Maureen Barber-Carey. "We provide our professionals with world class training and experiences to ensure that our students have access to the best education possible."

The fellowship is open to any graduate/undergraduate degree, course of study or professional experience. Employment opportunities include special education teachers, paraprofessional paraeducators, behavior technicians and mental health professionals.

"Though we actively recruit individuals with a variety of backgrounds and experiences," said Dr. Barber-Carey, "we look for those with a commitment to helping students of all abilities reach their full potential."

Fellows will receive competitive pay, benefits, paid holidays and forbearance on student loans, as well as job placement support and graduate school opportunities such as scholarships and service credit after the fellowship.

Gannon's Chamber Orchestra Inspires Students

Elizabeth Lee Black School students knew they were going to a "petting zoo" but this was no ordinary menagerie. In place of goats and sheep, the gym was filled with musicians from Gannon University's Erie Chamber Orchestra. Students rotated through stations featuring various string and percussion instruments where they not only listened to the music, but also played the instruments themselves.

By offering this "hands on" approach to music, Steve Weiser, Orchestra general manager, believes the "petting zoo" creates a once-in-a-lifetime experience for students.

"It is important that any child of any age or situation be a part of music in this way," said Weiser. "It gives them a physical chance to create sound and make music not only by listening, but also by playing the instruments themselves and really feeling the vibrations of the sounds being made."

The musicians participating in the event included Howard Lyon and Louis Nicolia on the violins, Jennifer Jansen on the viola, Ruth Ann Scanzillo on the cello, and Steve Weiser on percussion. One by one, students were able to play each instrument and feel the vibration as the bow glided across the strings. At the end of each session, the children danced and clapped to a light-hearted jig played on the violins.

"The event today was fabulous! The interactions between the children and the musicians were great; the children were simply spellbound," said Dr.

Maureen Barber-Carey, executive vice president of the Barber National Institute. "A lot of the children have difficulty sitting for long periods of time, but today they were sitting patiently because they wanted to play the instruments so much. I knew they would enjoy the music, but I never expected that they would have so many opportunities to play the instruments."

The Barber Institute has built a strong commitment to the arts through collaborations with community artists including ArtsErie and the Young People's Chorus of Erie.

"This is just a new component to our strong programs in the arts. We would love to continue the 'musical petting zoo' and offer it more frequently for the kids in the future," said Dr. Barber-Carey.

Gavin's First Steps

ek into Julie Moore's classroom, and you're sure to notice a smiling 12-year-old boy with short brown hair moving independently around the room.

It's hard to believe that just a year ago Gavin Nelson relied completely on a wheelchair for mobility. Like many parents who have children with cerebral palsy, Gavin's parents were told he may never walk.

But thanks to the determination of his family, teachers, therapists and – most importantly – Gavin himself, he is now walking with the help of a Gait Trainer, a type of walker designed to improve cognition, muscle development and skeletal growth.

Gavin began services at the Barber National Institute at the age of three in the Early Intervention Specialized Preschool program. Since then, he has practiced walking skills with his physical therapist, Christina Gross, and staff at the Institute, as well as his family while at home. He has also become much more independent with other life skills.

At the beginning of the school year, Gavin began using the Gait Trainer to travel to and from lunch every day. As the year progressed, he started to spend the entire school day out of his wheelchair. While at the playground, Gavin will often leave the Gait Trainer behind and just rely on the support of his staff to walk.

"His legs have gotten stronger from being up on his feet," said his teacher, Julie Moore. "It was a gradual increase to get to this point, but now he's become an independent traveler...and he's picking up speed too!"

Julie also attributes much of Gavin's success to the support and encouragement he receives at home from his family.

"His family gives him a lot of experience walking at home and they do many of the same things we do in the classroom," said Julie. "This consistency can really produce results." For Gavin, it means that taking his first step is a dream come true.

The event is perfect for recreational fitness enthusiasts who want to experience the thrills of the obstacle challenges that are sweeping the nation, as well as hardcore competitors who are looking to push their limits. Participants can choose their course distances with options for 4, 6 and 8 mile routes, as well as the 12-mile "Beast" and the 15+ mile master's level route.

Adults with physical or developmental disabilities are invited to a 1.5 mile adapted course that will be easy to access for both ambulatory participants as well as those using wheel chairs (see story p. 8-9).









And the best part of the event is that it benefits a worthy cause: making dreams come true for children and adults with autism and other developmental disabilities. All proceeds will help ensure that the highest quality supports are available for the more than 4,200 individuals and families served annually by the Barber National Institute.

Ty & The Beast

"The Beast" might seem fierce and imposing to some people, but certainly not to little Ty Stull. He breaks out in a grin and runs for a hug whenever he sees the scaly green mascot.

But the truth is that Ty has plenty of smiles and hugs to go around. The happy five-year-old has made such tremendous progress in the Early Intervention preschool class that he is moving on to classes in his home school district in the fall.

When Ty began attending the preschool program in fall 2010, his teachers remember a shy boy who kept to himself. "Now he's everybody's best friend," said teacher Denise Stoutamyer. "The whole room lights up when Ty comes through the door. His ability to communicate has just flourished and he is now speaking in full sentences."

Denise said that Ty enjoys everything—from going to therapy to playing on the playground. For her, watching him walk across the stage at graduation was bittersweet. "We are going to miss having him with us, but we are so happy that he is really prepared to move on."

Barber Beast Adapted Course: *Celebrating a Life*

an inspiration to her family.

A young lady who loved to laugh, ride roller coasters and root for her favorite sports teams will be memorialized at a new event celebrating the achievements of adults with disabilities. The Russo and Riazzi families are sponsoring the Barber Beast on the Bay Adapted Course that will be held on September 7 in memory of their daughter, niece and sister, Maureen Riazzi.

With their sponsorship, the families honor the young woman who brought them joy and love for 33 years, as well as support the mission of the Barber National Institute in serving children and adults with disabilities.

Early Life & Ties to Erie

Although Maureen was born and lived in Dayton, Ohio, her family has strong ties to the Erie area. Maureen's father, Carmen Riazzi, is still considered one of the greatest basketball players to hail from this region. And her aunt and uncle, Peter and Flo Riazzi Russo, have been active their entire lives in Erie's athletic and community organizations.

"Coming from Erie, I of course knew about the Barber Center," said Carmen. "Our family agreed that this would be a good way to help a very worthwhile organization that is doing so much to help people with disabilities."

A Family's Uncertainty and Resilience

Maureen was born on April 28, 1961, weighing only 5 lbs, 2 oz. Her mother, Ann, remembers being concerned about her right from the start. "I already had a child at home (a son born a year earlier) and I knew that something was not right," said Ann.

Maureen started walking at 13 months of age, but seemed to fall a lot. Over time, the falls became more frequent and often resulted in injuries. While many doctors' visits and tests still did not provide clear answers, Maureen was finally diagnosed with scoliosis, and one pediatrician suspected cerebral palsy.

Though Maureen, or "Reenie," was in a wheelchair by age 12, the Riazzi family was determined that nothing would hold her back. She attended school, and later on a workshop program. She often joined her family on trips to amusement parks on vacation. "The boys would lift her in and out of the car, and even onto the rides in the parks," said Ann.



Watch out for The Beast

It's big,...it's beastly...it's coming to an event near you! Maureen's Spirit Lives On

Although nearly two decades have gone by since Maureen's death, her life continues to be an inspiration for the Riazzis. "She was truly a gift to our family," said Ann. "Every one of my children is a better person because Maureen was part of our family. They have all become more generous, caring adults, always ready to give to others who need help."

That desire to help others led to the sponsorship of the Adapted Course in Reenie's memory. For the Russo and Riazzi families, the idea that adults with developmental and physical disabilities can conquer an obstacle course challenge—and have a good time—brought to mind memories of Reenie's indomitable spirit.

Notre Dame Researcher to Discuss Robot Therapy

Dr. Joshua Diehl, a psychology professor at the University of Notre Dame, will provide an update on the research collaboration involving the use of robots to reinforce social and communication skills for children with autism. The program, which is offered to the community free of charge, will be held on Wednesday, Sept. 25 at 6:00 p.m. at the Barber National Institute forum. The presentation is designed for educators, behavior therapists/therapeutic support staff, speech therapists and parents; Act 48 credit is available.

The research has drawn international attention with Dr. Diehl speaking around the world, including at the International Society for Autism Research held in San Sebastian, Spain in April. News outlets covering the project have included the Wall Street Journal, ABC News, and NPR.

Since Notre Dame and the Barber National Institute announced the collaboration in May, 2012, preliminary results have suggested that many children participating in the studies have shown an increase in skill development when the robot is added to therapy sessions.
