When we think about fun summertime activities, swimming has to be high on the list. As area children and adults take to pools and beaches over the coming weeks, we know that thousands of them have learned to swim in the Barber National Institute pool. This facility has been a valued resource since it opened in the late 1970s, offering learn-to-swim and a variety of exercise classes for our community.

There are many things that make our pool unique. First, we keep the water at a therapeutic temperature of 88 degrees. Secondly, our pool is one of only a handful in the country with a floor that raises to deck level. Our teachers and therapists can move wheelchairs right onto the pool floor, and then lower the floor back underwater. This has made entering and exiting the pool safe not only for our students and adults in wheelchairs, but also persons with arthritis or other conditions who can benefit from water exercise and therapy.

Now, after more than 30 years of steady use, our pool needs a renovation. We are planning to replace the mechanisms and machinery that enable the floor to raise, as well as create more comfortable and accessible locker rooms and shower facilities.

You will be hearing a lot about this renovation project as we prepare for upcoming fundraisers, including Erie Gives and the Christmas Ball. So many people have benefited from this great resource that we hope to be successful in giving it a much-needed overhaul. We will be looking to our generous donors, who are so dedicated to our mission, to support this initiative.

Speaking of summer, I hope that it is a wonderful time to relax with family and friends. Please know how much we appreciate your support and friendship in our shared goal of making dreams come true.



n the nearly 30 years that he was a priest, Fr. Michael Allison was widely known for his generosity and deep concern for others – particularly young people.

"I lost count of the number of young people who came up to me at the funeral to tell me that Mike had changed their life," said Chris Allison, Fr. Mike's brother.

Fr. Mike's youngest brother, Craig, was also moved by many of those same stories. "Mike was always accepting of everyone and wanted everyone to know that God loved them," said Craig.

That's why Chris and Craig were not surprised when they learned that their brother had selected a small group of non-profits that he believed truly helped others, including the Barber National Institute, to receive a gift from his estate.

"My dad's estate had left him well cared for, and he wanted everything that he had to go to charities that helped people," said Chris.

Both Chris and Craig trace their brother's deep empathy for those in need to a time growing up near a man with developmental disabilities who lived in their neighborhood.

This sense of compassion was reinforced by their late mother, Susie Allison, who developed a friendship with Dr. Gertrude Barber and became an early supporter of what was then the Barber Center.

Chris and Craig believe that their brother also came to know many families through his ministry that had been helped by the services of the Barber National Institute. "He had always been impressed by how Dr. Barber dedicated her life to people with challenges," said Craig. "He recognized the Barber Institute for the good work that it has always done."

"Be good to each other. Love each other. God is good, all the time."

Fr. Mike – as he was called by all those who knew him – had served as a chaplain and teacher at Mercyhurst Prep and chaplain at Penn State Erie, the Behrend College. He was the pastor of St. Mark the Evangelist Parish in Erie before his assignment as pastor of Beloved Disciple Parish in Grove City, where he served until his death in 2020. He had also been a teacher at Kennedy Catholic High School and president of the Shenango Valley Catholic School System.

A lifelong learner with many interests, Fr. Mike earned master's degrees in education, theology and divinity.

Every Christmas, he ended his sermon with the same message: "Be good to each other. Love each other. God is good, all the time."

This simple creed guided Fr. Mike as he not only made an impact on those he knew during his lifetime, but also as his legacy brings hope and comfort to many others for years to come. "We are grateful that Fr. Mike was so committed to the mission of the Barber National Institute that he made it part of this legacy," said Laura Schaaf, director of Giving. "Fr. Mike made a difference in the lives of so many people. Now, his generosity will continue making a difference in the lives of children and adults with disabilities today, and well into the future."

or many years, even those closest to Jesús Claudio didn't know much about him. Like how he enjoys sitting out by the water or hates having oatmeal in the morning.

Then, Dorcas Carillo came into his life.

The two met seven years ago when Dorcas started as a direct care professional in Club Erie. Jesús, who left Puerto Rico at the age of 15, spoke only Spanish. As Dorcus began speaking to Jesús in his native language, a bond started forming between them. Then, when Jesús decided to retire from the day program, Dorcas was asked to transfer to Residential to work with him in his group home.

The more Dorcas talked to Jesús, the more she learned about him, including how he grew up in poverty in Puerto Rico and then in Florida. The trust that formed has led to major changes in Jesús' life. "When I started, everyone told me that Jesús would not talk. Now, there are days where he does nothing but talk –

non-stop," Dorcas said.

The first thing that Jesús asked Dorcas to do was read the Bible to him. Slowly, he began to talk about his childhood, working alongside his parents as a migrant worker in Florida and around Erie. "Learning about what he went through, I understand better what he feels now," said Dorcas.

Jesús also had a problem with aggressive behavior that Dorcas believes was caused by his inability to communicate. He had a picture communication board, but Dorcas realized that the words were labeled in traditional Spanish, instead of the dialect that Jesús knew.

"We had to find how to get over the barrier of communication. He felt like 'I don't know how to tell you how I feel so maybe if I act out it will get your attention.' We've worked on how he could let the staff know these things in other ways," said Dorcas.

To help expand his options, Dorcas is also using an iPad to teach Jesús how to say commonly used words in English.

Dorcas said that seeing Jesús at ease and feeling understood has been the most rewarding thing for her. "I can see that he has changed a lot. He is not the aggressive man he was when I first met him," she said.

Dorcas also sees him growing in his relationship with other staff. "When new staff come into the home, Jesús won't say their name until he really feels comfortable with them," said Dorcas. "So, when he does start using their name, they get so excited because it means that he fully trusts them."

Dorcas also frequently cooks the food that Jesús liked from his childhood, and takes him on outings to Presque Isle where sitting by the water reminds him of Puerto Rico. "He was really uprooted from his culture," said Dorcas. "But now, I think he feels that even though he is not with his (biological) family, he is really home."

The encouragement that he received from the couple helped him be successful at a job he loves. "If I get behind doing the dishes, Angie and George will come over and help me out," said James. "They are not only my bosses, they are my friends."

To show his appreciation, James reached out to the Supported Employment staff to help him create a "Best Boss Award" that he could give to George and Angie. He also wrote a letter for George to read at the presentation.

In taking the initiative to create a personalized award, James was able to convey his gratitude. "They are caring, thoughtful ... I plan on working there for many years to come."

George and Angie also expressed how grateful they are to have found James. "He says that he is lucky to have found this job, but we are lucky to have him," said Angie. "Everyone should have a James in their life."

Church members came on board when they learned that they would be honoring two special fellow members — Seth Sheldon and Sophie Heath.

It's the first Beast for all of them, meaning there's a little apprehension with the excitement. "At first, most people said, 'Can't we just give a donation?' But I said wouldn't it be more fun if we actually did this together," laughed Kim. "I said sure, we can do it, and even if we can't, we'll have fun hanging out and it is all for such a good cause."

While the "Supporters of Seth and Sophie" team adds members, others in the congregation have vowed to cheer on those tackling the course. And for the fifth time, Seth will be participating in the Adapted Course.

Kim had been wanting to take part in the Beast for a few years, and decided to take on the challenge in honor of Seth and Sophie, a

ten-year-old girl with Down syndrome who also attends her church. Seth and Sophie became friends at church, and Kim wanted to recognize the special place they hold in the hearts of all of the congregation.

Kim first met Seth 12 years ago in her job in a life skills class in the Millcreek School District. Then, in 2017, when he started with Agency with Choice at the Barber National Institute, Seth's family asked Kim to continue working with him.

Seth, now 23, enjoys their time together playing basketball, bowling and swimming. Kim is also working on helping him develop life skills such as cleaning and meal planning. Every week, they decide on menus, make up a shopping list and then go to the grocery store for the ingredients they will need. It's gotten so that Seth knows how to check the pantry, and then let Kim know what to add to the list. He will quickly go up and down the store aisles to find just the right brand.

Now, as Kim and her teammates prepare to take on the Beast, she hopes what they are doing will mean a better life for Seth and others with disabilities. "I think that the Barber Institute does such a great job, and the people who work there do amazing work," said Kim. "Through the Beast, I want to help provide financial support for that mission, and to help support people with special needs."



Update on Canonization Process

meeting was recently held at the Vatican as the formal process continues concerning the possible canonization of the late Dr. Gertrude A. Barber as a saint in the Catholic Church.

In his role as Postulator for The Cause for Gertrude Barber, Monsignor Tom McSweeney met with representatives of the Office for the Congregation of the Saints, the department within the Vatican which oversees the complex process of evaluating candidates for possible canonization.

As Postulator, Msgr. McSweeney, a retired priest in the Erie Diocese, is the point of contact for anyone wishing information or to provide testimony as part of the investigation. "We had a very productive meeting where I was able to gain a lot



of information that will be helpful to guide us in the process, as well as formally present the credentials that support the opening of the Cause for Dr. Barber," said Msgr. McSweeney.

The Cause was officially opened when The Most Rev. Lawrence T. Persico, Bishop of Erie, issued a decree on Dec. 12, 2019.

The first phase of the process, which involves the gathering of documentation and formal interviews with persons wishing to discuss their interactions with Dr. Barber during her lifetime, is currently underway. The community is invited to a presentation on Wednesday, Sept. 28 at 7 p.m. at the Jefferson Educational Society, 3207 State Street in Erie. Executive Vice President Dr. Maureen Barber-Carey and Postulator Monsignor Tom McSweeney will address "Gertrude Barber: Exploring her life and the journey to sainthood." The program is free of charge.

New Look Bringing New Opportunities

Major renovations now underway at the Bollinger campus of the Barber National Institute will soon mean more comfortable and accessible facilities for adults with disabilities and their families. The project is being funded by a capital campaign that is close to its \$1.2 million goal, thanks to support from donors throughout the region.

Updates will include improved lighting, painting and flooring, and additional windows in program areas. Construction will also create a conference room, a computer center and area to view multi-media, a multi-purpose room to enhance staff training, an ADA bathroom/changing area with ceiling track lifts to transfer clients, and an updated elevator that can be used for production and programming.

An entryway is also being renovated to add a handicap accessible ramp, automatic doors and a covered and heated walkway, as well as a parking area for easier drop off and pick up of program participants.

"All of these improvements that are being funded by our donors will truly help us better meet the needs of the individuals we now serve and to provide for any future individuals that may have more physical challenges," said Kim Nowell, program manager at the Bollinger campus. "In the past, it was difficult to accommodate these individuals, but now we will be able to serve more individuals with a wider range of challenges in Warren County. That's exciting news for us and for many families in the area." Renovations are expected to be completed by mid-September.

Thank You, Warren Gives

Donors came together for Warren Gives on May 18. With the prorated match from the Community Foundation of Warren, the Bollinger campus received \$8,110 to be used for the renovation project.



Christopher Rose asked his teacher for a pair of scissors to complete an art project. Just a year ago, making this simple request wouldn't have been possible. But that was before Christopher learned to use a new communication device that his teacher and speech therapist say has opened up a whole new world for him.

In fact, the Touch Chat program for Christopher's new iPad has led to dramatic changes academically and socially for the 19-year-old. "It was clear that Christopher had a lot that he wanted to say, but had no real way to express himself," said speech therapist Carly Stewart. "Now, we see this whole personality that has emerged."

Christopher started at the Elizabeth Lee Black School in 2020 after moving from Ohio. Teachers realized that he had no functional communication, relying on gestures and sounds that were only recognizable by those closest to him.

Carly began introducing a variety of communication devices, and found that Christopher immediately took to the Touch Chat program for the iPad. The software could be fully customized with words and phrases Christopher would commonly use. Broad categories such as school, clothing, and days of the week are set up, and Christopher presses symbols or pictures within those categories to choose what he wants to convey.

Christopher enjoyed using the device during his weekly speech therapy sessions. "When he got his own iPad and I told him he could take it home he used the device to say 'That is sweet!" remembers Carly.

Since then, teacher Lisa DuShole has seen Christopher use the device to initiate conversations with his classmates, talk about movies he has seen and even tell jokes. He is now also using the device to learn to sight-read words.

"He is so much happier in school, and learning so much every day," said Lisa. "He gets really excited when he figures out new words and forms sentences that he will clap for himself." On that, all of those working with Christopher agree – he really does deserve a round of applause.

A Search for Success

year of hands-on learning and job skill building culminated for five students with their graduation from Project Search on May 24.

The program is a collaboration among five community partners: AHN Saint Vincent Hospital, the Barber National Institute, the Erie School District, the Office of Vocational Rehabilitation and the Erie County Dept. of Human Services to provide real-world training opportunities in preparation for employment.



Job coaches from the Barber Supported

Employment Program assist students during in-class instruction on topics such as employment expectations and social skills, resume building and interview preparation, and financial literacy. The job coaches also support the students as they rotate through internships they select from among six departments at Saint Vincent Hospital.

Even though each student's experience might be different, job coach Joseph Marchini said they have all changed significantly by graduation time. "The biggest thing is the way each of them has gained so much confidence. They were all very unsure when they started in September about what they wanted to do and how they would fit in. It is amazing to see how much they have grown," said Marchini.

Three students already have job commitments, and two are exploring opportunities.

This marked the second year for the Project Search program, which last year saw seven graduates. Ten high school students are currently preparing to begin the program in Fall 2022.

Graduate Mentors Student



ne of the highlights of the Project Search graduation is the opportunity that students have to present their own Star Mentor Award to a Saint Vincent staff who they think has helped and inspired them over the past year.

For Zach Smith, the choice was an easy one. He selected Javonta Montgomery, an employee in the Environmental Services Department who was hired by the hospital after participating in Project Search last year. "He helped me with my training when I started in ESD," said Zach. "He showed me all around the hospital, and taught me what to clean and how to clean it."

Zach learned well from Javonta's example. He is now also being hired by Saint Vincent Hospital to work in Environmental Services.

For Zach, the job is a great conclusion to what was a wonderful experience. "I liked the opportunity to get a lot of different job experiences," said Zach. "I liked meeting new people and learn from them in the jobs they were doing."

With a job, Zach now hopes to earn enough to live independently – and, like every teenager – to get his own car and driver's license. Good luck, Zach!

For some, the journey here only lasted a year or two. For others, it was for much of their young lives. Regardless of the duration, we are thankful for the time we had with graduates and wished them well as they celebrated the successes they achieved at the Elizabeth Lee Black

School and their plans for a bright future.

Eleven students completed the approved private school program and will move onto community employment or adult programs. Twenty-eight students in Erie and Corry also completed preschool programs and will be moving onto kindergarten.
